Redmon Racing Results

There are not too many racing results to report in this newsletter, as our club racing season doesn't seem to have really started yet.

Sean Taylor rode the Kingston Wheelers Sporting event on GS/292A on 10 Feb, and finished in 40:44, in what was probably very, very cold weather, so well done to him.

Our Chairman, Chris Brewer, rode the Southern Counties CU Sporting 10 on the G10/46 on 23 Mar, and finished in 36m which was a PB for that event, so congratulations Chris!

John McGlashan and Chris both rode the Kingston Phoenix 10 on the G10/42 (in practice for the Redmon Open?) on 6 Apr. John finished in 25:58 and Chris in 29:34.

And our man in the North, Paul Scaplehorn, raced the North Tyneside Riders CC 10 on the M102B on 13 Apr finishing in 26:57. Must be cold up there! ;-)

The Old Days

Before coming down South, "where the streets are paved with gold", I did seven years with the Royal Navy.

For the years before that, I rode with the Ely City Road Club from 1948 to 1951. Our club room was a shed at Witcham Hall, belonging to John Brown's father who was a local coal merchant. His father cleared the shed of coal, and the club members provided furniture to make it into a comfortable club room, which we enjoyed. Although, the club room was two to three miles outside Ely, we always had a good get together, sorting out club events and the odd open.

Several of us entered one open event, for which we had to cycle to Witcham Hall early in one Sunday morning. We all piled into one of John's father's lorries, and was taken to Wisbech for a 25 mile time trial. The course was fast and very flat being in the Fens - it was won in 1:01:27. None of us did anything special, so we didn't get the team prize.

Our club events mostly started at Ely High Bridge on the A142. The 25 course went along the A142 to Newmarket and returned. Our 50 was similar to the 25 course, but also went on the A11, with a dead turn in the middle of the road at the Elveden Memorial. We also used a 10 course from Witchford, and turned at Sutton, but not in Surrey, Cambs!.

Our club champion was Mac Wetstone, in those days we thought of him as very fast, always winning our club events.

Unfortunately, the club folded in 1951/52 as most of us were called up for National Service, and signed on, as I did.

However, many years later after I had settled in Sutton, this time in Surrey, I received an invitation to ride a sponsored 50 mile event up in the Fens, in the hope of restarting the Ely Club again.

After this the club took off again, and is still going strong now, with some very good riders. I've been back up again to ride with their early season 2 up event with Tony Fielding. The course for this event goes out towards Chateris on the causeways, and is usually run in March, when it's unfortunately very windy in the Fens. It was a case of riding to try and shelter each other, all good fun!!

We all have great memories, and I hope I haven't bored you all too much.

PS: A word of thanks to those club members that have helped Brenda and I since we have been without a car.

Also for those of you that knew Ned Walsh – he was 94 in November.

For those of you that aren't aware, and I apologise for having not notified you, my father and long time member of the Redmon, Ron Allen, passed away on 18 February. His funeral took place on 27 March at Woking Crematorium. A big thank you to the many club members that came to pay their last respects.

It's quite amazing what you learn about someone at such a sad time, he was quite a rider. I have been looking back through his photos and the memorabilia of his time racing and the many years in the Redmon. He achieved some very fine results, much better than I have, or ever could.

He joined the Redmon in 1949, having previously only been a touring cyclist in the CTC, Sutton. His first race for the Club was the Kentish Wheelers Novices 25 in March 1950, on his new yellow Hetchins (curly stays). He was placed fourth and the first Redmon rider. Three months later set a new club 25 record at 1:01:05. He won many events during his racing 'career' in the 1950s, including a 100 mile event in his first attempt at the distance.

None of his times are particularly impressive compared with those of today. However, they need to be put into perspective –roads and bikes are so different today, and he mainly rode using fixed wheel. His results were undoubtedly exceptional.

I plan to ride the club event on 20th June on his bike. It was built by Ted Woodall of Leader Cycles in Croydon in the 1950s, the same shop that provided Eileen Sheriden with some bikes. So why not join me to race your classic bike that Thursday. Hopefully, I'll be ready, as there's quite a bit of work needed to get it road worthy! We could make it a Special Redmon Vintage TT.

Don't you hate it when someone, on hearing that you ride a bike, immediately launches into a diatribe against cyclists who behave badly on the road? It makes you uncomfortable and defensive, doesn't it? Well, more than a century ago it was rather worse, with the addition of the prejudice of the Law, as the following illustrates:

The Hammersmith stipendiary Mr Paget, was most certainly intensely disliked by cyclists for his habit of imposing the maximum penalty for riding furiously. In a worthy piece of satire, the December issue of the Wheel World, 1881, described a typical court hearing, which they said, 'was certainly not more exaggerated than the evidence of the police'.

'At the Sledgehammersmith Police Court, on 31 November, 1881, John Smith, William Robinson, Thomas Brown, and James Jones appeared to answer summonses charging them with furiously riding bicycles the previous evening. Police constable ZYX 4002 deposed that he was on duty the previous evening, and saw the defendants riding at a rate of forty miles an hour; he walked after them and overtook them in Low Street, taking them to the station handcuffed. Crossexamined by the defendants the constable said he was quite sure that they were riding at a rate of eighty miles an hour, and he almost shook the creases out of his trousers in an effort to catch up with them; he could swear they were travelling at a speed of three hundred miles an hour. Police constable ZYX 4003, corroborated this evidence, saying that he was in the London Dock area at the time, and distinctly saw the defendants travelling in Low Street, Sledgehammersmith, at a rate of five hundred miles an hour. For the defence, a number of independent witnesses were called. They claimed that the bicyclists were travelling at the slowest rate compatible with keeping the bicycles upright - viz., about four miles an hour. The defendants also said that it was impossible to ride a bicycle at the rate alleged, but Mr Paget interrupted, and said that that had nothing to do with the case, and that he should refuse to hear any more evidence for the defence. He was heartily sorry the law did not allow him to send the defendants to penal servitude for life; as it was, he should fine them the highest amount in his power, namely, forty shillings and costs each, or, in default, a month on the treadmill'.
